LILLER B. GREEN
 "A LIVING LEGACY"



At the age of two, Liller began attending a one-room schoolhouse in Athens, Georgia with her sister Irma. It was under the watchful eye of Mrs. Rosabelle Strickland, a Spelman graduate, that Liller learned to read and discovered her lifelong love for learning. They alternated play periods with blocks of teaching time and completed the first grade curriculum before school age and were fully prepared for school.

While in middle school, Liller began giving dramatic presentations and was often asked to do recitals in churches in the area. Liller excelled in school, graduating with high honors from the South Philadelphia High School for Girls in 1946. After working two years to help pay for college, she entered Morgan State College in Baltimore, Maryland. She made friendships then that remain strong today. Liller graduated from Morgan with honors (magna cum laude) in 1951. She received a full scholarship for graduate study from the Grand Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority and received her M.S.S. Degree from Bryn Mawr College.

William Green received his Master's Degree in Education from the University of Pennsylvania. Although William C. Green had seen Liller on Morgan's campus, it wasn't until they saw each other at an alumni meeting in Philadelphia that they fell in love and decided to marry. On June 21, 1952, they married at Tasker Street Baptist Church. After moving to Germantown, they joined Grace Baptist Church of Germantown the same year, and he remained a member until his death. Mrs. Green is still a member today. They both loved working with young people – he in the field of education and she as a psychiatric Social Worker who helped troubled families.

Liller along with her husband, the late William C. Green, founded Ivy Leaf School in Philadelphia, PA in 1965 when she could not find an academic pre-school that was similar to the one of her childhood, for her three-year-old daughter, Pam. It was the first African-American, private academic school established and licensed under the Pennsylvania Private Academic School Board.

The Greens trusted God that their pre-school would offer children the best in academic and social development. Liller believed the value for Ivy Leaf School had been to provide a place for our children. God wanted us to have a place for our children where:

There would be no discrimination.

They could bloom like flowers – soar like eagles – learn to do the impossible.

Pre-school children were taught to read, when experts said they could not learn to read.

African American boys and girls could become Leaders when others said we could not lead.

African American boys and girls could learn to achieve when others said we could not achieve.

Our African American children could learn about their heritage.

They could develop pride and self-confidence.

The Ivy Leaf School name was chosen because the original building was surrounded by ivy plants, and “Ivy League” schools were the most elite citadels of higher learning among colleges and universities. Under her guidance, the Ivy Leaf School in Philadelphia became one of the largest African American independent schools in the nation. At its prime, Ivy Leaf swelled to more than 800 students and 4 buildings across Philadelphia.

Many leaders, educators and journalists visited the school. In 1995, Governor Ridge toured and hailed it as an example of the future of education, of combining a good education with entrepreneurship and parent involvement. On December 9, 2002, Bill Cosby visited Ivy Leaf with two gifts. He gave a speech that captivated the 4th through 8th graders and loaned his Presidential Medal to the archives room of the school.

Recording artist Patti LaBelle called it her special Black History Month present after being honored by the Ivy Leaf School in East Oak Lane on Thursday, February 3, 2003. In her message to the students, she said “You give me chills and thrills as I remember when I went to school. My school was not this beautiful or organized. I didn’t have the goals that you have. It’s nice to see a wonderful example of our future. I am so proud of you. I just wanted to tell you to believe in yourselves and what you do, because God is good”.

Recognition of the school’s success came from local and national media. Articles appeared in prestigious national publications – such as The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, Christian Science Monitor, and U.S. News and World Report – many local newspapers and magazines – including The Philadelphia Inquirer, The New Observer, and The Leader – and television broadcasts, such as Eleanor Jean Henley’s City Lights, Pat Robertson’s 700 Club and Captain Kangaroo.

Ivy Leaf School served the community admirably for 43 years. However, with the growth of Charter schools, Catholic and Private school enrollment decreased. Ivy Leaf School was similarly affected and closed in 2008.

Mrs. Green is a proud member of The Philadelphia Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc. In 1991, Soror Liller Green received the Philadelphia Alumnae Chapter’s Sadie T.M. Alexander award for her “dedication to community service” at the annual May Week celebration. While watching the awarding of scholarships to outstanding high school seniors at that celebration, she was inspired to establish a scholarship endowment fund that would provide scholarships for the Sorority annually.

A devoted member of Grace Baptist Church of Germantown for over 53 years, She was the Director of the Youth Training Union (BTU) for 18 years, Chairperson of Eastern Baptist Congress of Christian Education (Spring Retreat) a member of the Deaconess Board, Co-Chair of Grace Baptist Church Community Center Committee , a member of the Courtesy Club and Bessie Campbell Ushers.

Mrs. Green is a former Sponsor of the Philadelphia Teen Twigs National Organization set up for the perpetuation of the highest physical, social, spiritual, and cultural ideas of school age children and young adults. She served as Chairperson of the 1982 and 1984 Jabberwock presented by The Philadelphia Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority (a public service Sorority) and served on the National Program Planning and Development Committee of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. 2000 - 2004.

Mrs. Green is listed in Who’s Who Among Black Americans. In addition to at least 14 other honors, Mrs Green received the Richard Allen Award for Total Commitment to Educating Black Children at the Highest Level and Continued Expansion of Black Educational

Facility in the City of Philadelphia and the Martin Luther King Drum Major for Educational Justice Award – 1997.

Deacon Candace Matthews-Bass is strongly committed to developing others, both in individual goals as well as artistically. Candace has made her gift of communication through advocating, teaching and mentorship her life and career.



Down parallel paths of dance and human development, Candace is blessed to serve others in both capacities.

Candace began dance training at the Diane Matthews School of Dance Arts at age 6. For 16 years she studied ballet, tap, modern jazz and tumbling. Candace continued dancing while she attended Drexel University as a performer and choreographer with the Drexel University Dance Ensemble as well as the captain of Drexel's first university dance team.

The beginning of her career in human service would be initiated during college with 2 years of experience in case management and outreach with underserved populations throughout the Delaware Valley. Candace graduated Drexel University with a Bachelor's of Science in psychology.

Candace's professional career in dance includes two seasons with Body Language Dance Company as well as a featured performer in Freedom Theatre's Alkynza Dance production. She additionally has been a member of West Chester Dance Works for over 20 years, both as principle dancer and corps performer. Candace's most notable credit includes being featured in the original production, *Rachel Harris: One Woman Over the Line* which ran for 4 years. Additionally, Candace directs and choreographs for West Chester Dance Works' Dance Team, DM Dance Machine, and assists in artistic direction alongside of Diane Matthews, Artistic Director. Through West Chester Dance Works, Candace has helped design and facilitate workshops and performances for community settings, perform and choreograph for local festivals and provide training for developing dancers, age 9 through adult. Other credits include performances in various venues in the Greater Philadelphia Area including the Wachovia Center, Painted Bride, the Philadelphia Art Museum and several colleges and universities. Candace has also enjoyed teaching Modern Jazz and Hip Hop to dancing school students aged 7 and up for over 20 years.

Following a year as an Americorps volunteer, the opportunity to join a brand new program in workforce development was introduced. It would be through Philabundance, and the development of the Philabundance Community Kitchen (PCK) that Candace's career would change trajectories. Through a part-time entry-level position, the community kitchen would offer program and leadership development experience to enable Candace's growth as a servant leader. This role enabled the ability to serve Philadelphia residents, pressing through difficult circumstances, in changing their lives through support and employment opportunities for over 20 years alongside a team of talented and passionate colleagues. During her tenure, milestones include:



graduating over 900 students; transitioning the program in size and scope in 3 different locations; growing the program to national recognition among the Feeding America and Catalyst Kitchen's networks; providing programming expertise and consultancies to more than 20 developing programs across the country; local, state and national media coverage including press, radio, local television and a feature on the former ABC show "The Chew", and leadership in transitioning PCK to a newly constructed \$12 million, state-of-the-art facility in the heart of North Philadelphia. While Candace is very humbled by these accomplishments, the work continues.

As Candace's dance life has continued, church presented an opportunity to combine her skills and passion for dance with ministry. Candace became the choreographer and artistic coordinator of the first formal praise dance ministry, Expressions of Praise, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. G. Daniel Jones in 2003 at the Grace Baptist Church of Germantown. Blessed with a small group of peer leaders, Candace teaches and develops choreography, costuming and music selection for this intergenerational praise dance ministry with dancers ages 9 to 70. This group has ministered from Philadelphia to Virginia celebrating God's promises through dance excellence at local events, special services, conferences and retreats for over 15 years.



Especially following the completion of her Master of Arts degree in Urban Studies, Candace knows God has been blessing her and enabling the talents, energy and strength necessary to balance these roles with being a wife to her husband Larry

and mother of two (Kiara and Larry, Jr.); the most important calls on her life. As a believer it is each person's responsibility to serve others as Christ did, and to love your neighbor as yourself. Candace works everyday to honor God through these principles at work, church and home.

Rev. **Dianne Faust** is an Associate Minister in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania at the historic Grace Baptist Church of Germantown, where she preaches the gospel of Christ and leads a ministry of presence within the Mt. Airy section of the City. Rev.



Faust is a graduate of Payne Theological Seminary (Ohio), with a Masters of Divinity. She is a past Fellow of The Center for Public Justice, an initiative of Sacred Sector. Rev. Faust has entered into a Doctoral program at the United Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia. With regards to her calling in Pastoral Care, Rev. Faust's goals are to "ensure that clergy are equipped with tools to help serve those in their congregation with something supplemental to what she calls "God-talk", such as resources related to housing, health, food, education, and employment. *"I feel we as Clergy are not meeting the needs of many who sit among us on Sunday,"* Rev. Faust said. A significant part of Rev Faust life has been dedicated to church ministry.

Community engagement is the single most important phrase for Rev. Faust ministry since she is embarking on a vocational journey to explore areas beyond the walls of a church, answering the call to engage more deeply as a political disciple and setup systems in the 21st century church. Rev. Faust uses her experience in real estate and seminary to help faith-based organizations to become equipped for community engagement.

Most recently faith, hope, love and concern propel Rev. Faust to engage in immediate circumstances that services citizenship. To prepare for the *PPE loan forgiveness program* Rev. Faust assembled clergy and business leaders on a National Conference call to hear from leaders in Washington, DC on how to prepare for receiving the first-round of relief benefits. Amid COVID-19, Rev. Faust has connected church leaders to resources, including two webinars with FDA advisory panelist, Dr. Oveta Fuller. In her earlier webinar she shared how to prepare congregations and sanctuaries for the realities of a coronavirus world. Most recently in Dr Fuller's webinar she and several Physicians and microbiologist shared with faith leaders how the virus interacts with the two approved emergency use vaccines Moderna and Pfizer. She also shifted the trajectory to relevant ministry systems in light of COVID-19 and mental stresses. Rev. Faust created a plan for a *55 plus Zoom ministry* that address the needs of COVID lockdown and mental health in seniors that can be used throughout the church community. Because of her concern for community. Rev. Faust has written a *75-page thesis on "Preventive Measures: Gateways to Better Health in African American Communities. April 2020"* It provides a roadmap on how religious leaders can become useful gateways, through which science-focused advances for healthy living can move into wider implementation, for the well-being of African Americans.

In addition, Rev. Faust has presented on an implementation for "*Shifting Culture and Mission Planning. August 2020*" It focuses on the direction churches are heading, and the decline in membership of once robust packed churches. The plan outlines historical, biblical, theological and practical procedures to follow in increasing discipleship.

During her many years of commitment to ministry, Rev. Faust has held positions of Trustee, Financial Officer, Class Leader, Comfort Care Supporter, Bible Study Teacher, Vacation Bible School Organizer, and Organized Lay Leader. Rev. Faust's passion in her spare time has been in real estate, and as an investor rehabbing property for over 30 years. She uses her experience in seminary, real estate, and her skillset in non-profit Faith-Based Organizations to link biblical principles that heals and bring fractured communities together. She is an active member of the *Samuel Dewitt Proctor Conference*, and alumnus of Payne Theological Seminary.

As a public servant, her Philanthropy consists for the good of increasing the quality of life in her beloved community. To promote human welfare, she has generously contributed to Payne Theological Seminary Scholarship Fund, Cooper Medical School, the Jeremiah Wright's academic chair at United Lutheran Seminary, Healing Communities, USA, and Broad Street Ministry, as well as many others.

She is married to Atty. William J. Faust, II who specializing in personal injury, and together they have five children. Dr. Jessica Richmond, Nayshawna Harris, Lei Samuel, William J. Faust, III, and Dr. Andrea Asomani.

Deacon Sandie Jordan Gordon was born and raised in the Mount Airy section of Philadelphia. She is a shining example of our city’s public school system. She attended Berean Institute and later received her Bachelor’s Degree from Antioch University and her Master’s from Temple U. Sandie is a retired Special Education Teacher.



She began attending Grace at the age of 4 and has been a member over 50 years. Sandie has always been active beginning with the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and the Brownies. She continued in scouting until High School. Eventually she became the Leader of the Senior Girl Scout Troop for several years. Deacon Sandie sang on the Chancel Choir and was also an Usher. Along with her late husband Deacon James K. Gordon, they sponsored the Golden Eagle Ushers for 30 plus years. In addition to her duties on the


Diaconate, Sandie is a member of the theatrical Drama Guild, the Seasoned Division of the Expressions of Praise Dance Ensemble, Monday/Tuesday Bible Study Class, The Women’s Retreat Ministry and the Friday Community Center Food Packers.

Recently Deacon Jordan-Gordon returned from a 17-day Missionary Field Trip in Jinja and Kampala, Uganda making her one of the first Missionaries from Grace to travel to a foreign continent for the sole purpose of missions. While there she helped distribute pillowcase dresses made by the American Baptist Women of Grace to children in surrounding and very remote villages, participated in worship services and she addressed a group of middle school girls encouraging them to continue their education so that they would be empowered and able to make a difference in their country trusting and believing with God all things are possible. (Matthew 19:29). Deacon Sandie hopes to recruit more church members to return with her to Uganda and keep the donations and dresses coming.



Nannie Saunders Paige, daughter of Susie, daughter of Roberta, daughter of Malinda, daughter of Jane born into enslavement in 1805, carries the DNA of the Fulani African people from the past to present-day Nigeria.

Born in 1922 and raised in Tazewell County, Virginia, Nannie graduated from Graham Colored High School. She attended HBCU Bluefield State College for several years.





She met Army man James E. Paige, Sr. while working at a shirt factory in Roanoke, Virginia. They married and lived in her hometown of Bluefield where three of their seven children were born. The family immigrated to Philadelphia in the 1950's. She joined Grace in 1956 and was active in Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, PTA and Courtesy Club.

Nannie worked alongside her husband and children in Paige's Take-Out, their deli and neighborhood store, just a few blocks from Grace. She's always been an activist working to make her community safer for all children.

Nannie grew to love walking with Grace friends in Valley Green after retirement. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, she's glad to see her church family on Zoom and Facebook. She particularly misses the Monday-Tuesday Bible Class, but says, "The Lord didn't bring us this far to leave us. My generation survived the Depression and diseases like polio. We will get through this together."



Selena F. Gillespie was born in Columbia, SC and is the middle child of five siblings. Her parents instilled in them the love of God, family and a good education. All five siblings graduated from a HBCU. Selena received her Degree



from Benedict College in Columbia, SC. During her professional career, Selena was a social worker at Columbia Hospital, caseworker for the Philadelphia Department of Public Assistance, and public school teacher for the Philadelphia School District. Growing up music was important to the family and she was always on the church and school choirs. She and a friend sang "Blue Moon", which was televised on "The Mickey Mouse Club".

Selena is a great seamstress and sewed clothes for her family and friends, including her daughter's wedding dress. After retirement, she started organizing very exciting and successful trips. Selena's first big trip was a cross-country train adventure. Since then she has traveled to Europe, Alaska and Australia.

Selena has been a member of Grace Baptist Church of Germantown since 1976. She and her daughter Robin joined Grace together and a year later Linda joined Grace under the Pastorship of Rev. Selena has served and continues to serve God in many ministries.

During her first years at Grace she faithfully attended Mrs. Leona Wimbush's Sunday School and Bible study classes. She was soon asked by Deacon Howard to participate in the teacher training classes to become a Sunday School teacher. She was a Sunday School teacher in the Junior Department for many years. She was one of the Honorees recognized for dedicated service during the Annual Teacher and Staff Appreciation Sunday. She also served as a Bible school teacher for many years and more recently as an assistant teacher. Selena wanted to volunteer with Ministries her daughters were active in, so she was the Business

Manager for her daughter's Girl Scout Troops and organized great trips and special events for the girls. She accompanied the girls on numerous camping and other special trips.
