He Did What?



From the keyboard of the editor

Last Sunday, Minister Blackson talked about women who tell their stories and what we can learn from them. I think back to a time when I heard a minister say, "No one can tell your story like

you can." The late Dr. G. Daniel Jones would give an update of his stewardship on his anniversary every year so that the church would know what he did on a day to day basis. Pastor Buck has not shared his labors with the church in the same way, and as a consequence, some have mistaken this silence for inaction. Nothing could be further from the truth. This edition of the Grace Beacon is sharing some of what Pastor Buck has done in his six years with us. You be the judge of whether he has been inactive! By the way, Pastor offered very little of this. Our Beacon Staff had to pull information from many sources to provide this update.

Led by the Spirit of God to accept the 10th Pastorate of Grace Baptist Church of Germantown, Rev. Dr. J. Henry Buck, Jr., has been faithfully working to fulfill the Lord's Will for His Church. Installed on April 30, 2017, Pastor Buck promptly became immersed in the culture of both the church and the community.

He immediately brought together the Associate Ministers to hear their desires for ministry and growth as well as opportunities for service, hosting them in the relaxed atmosphere of his home. He said at that time, and continues to say, that the Associate Ministers are prepared and capable of preaching the Gospel throughout Philadelphia and vicinity.

From his first year, Pastor has placed emphasis on congregational study. In addition to regular churchwide study, he led the congregation in an intensive study of the books, *I Am A Church Member…Discovering the Attitude That Makes The Difference, An African-American Perspective on Church Membership and Building A Contagious Church.*

In addition to the numerous counseling, weddings, home-going celebrations and other ministry obligations, Pastor Buck worked diligently with the youth in the community. At the invitation of a young parishioner, Rev. Buck attended the Martin Luther King, Jr. High School's King Day of Service. He led a workshop with the Philadelphia Police regarding how to engage Police, tips for academic success, social and spiritual health. He offered his phone number to the young men in attendance. That began a partnership with the school and its students which quietly continues today. Pastor Buck has served as a keynote speaker, workshop facilitator, caterer, panel participant and is an award recipient for his unwavering commitment to the youth of King High School even after the young man who initially invited him graduated.

Rev. Buck's inaugural year began the rich collaboration with Senator Dwight Evans, State Representative Stephen Kinsey, State Representative Chris Rabb and State Senator Art Haywood. This partnership directly led to a million dollar State grant for the construction of the Community Center. Pastor's partnership with the Northwest Coalition was responsible for the partnership with Chestnut Hill Hospital, Rite Aid Pharmacy, sister churches and civic leaders who came together to ensure equity in the dissemination of information and distribution of life saving Covid Vaccine. Grace Baptist Church was one of the first testing sites to serve our community.

Having received his Doctorate in Transformative Leadership with a dissertation topic *Reduction of Recidivism in African Americans Through Community Based Programs,* Rev. Buck desired to create a program which put the premises of his paper into practice. His great wish was to utilize Grace Community Center to

bring this ministry opportunity to our church for our community. Unfortunately, the legal separation between the church and the center required for this to happen, has not been achieved to the present. The GCCC remains under the 5013C of the church and is not an independent legal entity.

Because of the current need in our community and the calling of God to address this need, *Southern Flames* was born. Rev. Buck has turned soul food into a business model that employs traditional employees working beside men and women who don't need a handout but rather a hand up, to change their life trajectories when many others said "no way." Southern Flames is now a model hailed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as a model to reduce the recidivism rate of non-violent felons by allowing them to receive training, counseling and marketable skills so that they may become contributing members of society.

Rev. Buck continues his pastoral ministry: mentoring 6 Ministers for ordination set for this year; mentoring 1 MIT and possibly another to come along; encouraging and directing Grace Clergy to be involved and visible. Advocating for them to get their ministries back up and running. (Sunday School, Children's Church, Youth, Wellness, Marriage, Ushers, New Members, etc.,). Within our church, leadership continues to grow. From the ordination or licensing of 4 female Deacons, 1 male Deacon to the recent conferences where some church leaders came together to work on and rewrite important church missional statements, Pastor Buck continues to emphasize the importance of, not only recognizing God's purpose for His people in the life of Grace Baptist Church of Germantown, but also living it. He teaches Bible Study each Wednesday evening at 6:00 pm with prayer meeting immediately following.

While budgetary constraints often limit what can be done, they have not stopped ministry. In response to the need for summer camp and in the face of budgetary concerns, Pastor's vision for *SEE at Grace* was created. It was primarily funded, at no cost to the church, by donations and minimal tuition costs to parents. It provided an opportunity for enrichment and opportunity for growth in both the students and staff.

Through participation in Ministerial and Civic Associations and through visits to other churches, Pastor Buck keeps abreast of what is happening in the Church and Community. Guest speakers and preachers have been uplifting and diverse. This year, Grace was re-established as a venue for *Preaching With Power*.

While unrest, chaos and violence plague our city, Pastor Buck has been in the midst of providing responses. For example, when social unrest after the death of George Floyd rocked Philadelphia (in addition to the rest of the nation), Rev. Buck and several of the Associate Ministers were called to participate in an attempt to quell the unrest at risk to their personal safety. These men and women of God prayed for, with and over our city, speaking with young people and diffusing aggression as they walked the streets of Philadelphia. Out of this grew the **Philly Safe** movement which was co-founded by Rev. Buck and which, in January 2023, received a \$220,000 grant which is being used for cleaning, lighting and greening of neighborhoods in the Mt. Airy section of town.

During the Pandemic when human physical connections were few, Pastor led the Audio-Visual Team to step up our technological capabilities so that we could worship, study, conduct church business and stay connected with each other. During this time, Pastor supported Rev. Brian Wallace's desire to create an on-line prayer line which has given comfort and hope to many and continues to be operational. The Prayer line reached beyond Grace into the community, as did Pastor's use of Social Media to have Community Bible Study.

Because of the pandemic, Pastor met with and encouraged the Music Department to alter choirs, create another unified choir (United Voices of Grace) and re-establish Praise and Worship to reach others in a special way.


In the past six years of his pastorate, Grace Baptist Church has seen growth in a number of ways, despite 2.5 years of pandemic. Under Rev. Buck's pastorate approximately 30 have accepted Christ as their personal Savior and have been baptized; approximately 38 have received the Right Hand of Fellowship; at least 3 couples have been married and 5 babies have been dedicated by Rev. Buck. God has called at least 60 of our members home to glory, and Pastor conducted the Home Going service for most of them.

Despite the challenges we have faced, now face and will face, God continues to lead Pastor and people forward, showing us how to live out our motto, *In the Heart of the Community, Seeking Ever To Win the Community's Heart,* Our vision, *To be Christ-centered followers obeying the Word of God, shining brightly in the community and sharing the message of hope where faith and real life come together*, and Our mantra, *Hope Happens Here!*

May we always remember that no leader can be strong without the support of faithful followers, and that each member has a role to play in the retention of members! Did you have cross words with another member? Did a new member see or hear that and decide to walk away? That wasn't the fault of the leadership, was it?

Remember Romans 12:18, "If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men" and Romans14:19 "So then, let us pursue what leads to peace and to mutual edification." That is <u>God's</u> vision for His church according to the Apostle Paul.

- The ability to carry and lift up to 50 lbs.




