But I've been thinking lately about how hard it is to love hard-to-love people. I've been worn down by hurtfulness and pettiness in various places. It's been the kind of soul-exhausting tension that makes me want to hibernate and hide away from all human contact for a few months. I want to breathe a little easier before heading out into the big wide world of other people where I'm being too frequently trampled.

Maybe, though, maybe I need to remember that in life, we're all on the "Eve" and not quite ready for "the day."

Nobody is perfect yet and we're all in this together.

This is what we have to look forward to:

Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is (1 John 3:2 ESV).

In the meantime, though, before Jesus returns and we're seeing Him face-to-face in heaven, we're making messes in the kitchen and making last-minute runs to the grocery store for the items we've forgotten. It's better to laugh at all this than despair over it.

We're creating our own stories, our own testimonies of where we've come from and where God has brought us, and it's messy, but it's good.

Colossians 3:13 says,

Bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive.

We're giving grace to others because we've been lavishly, extravagantly forgiven and we've been loved by God even though we don't merit that love and haven't earned His affection.

Of course, we can still take a little time away to catch our breath when others hurt us. We can set some healthy boundaries and speak some honest words in a loving way.

But we can also overlook some offenses and offer a little safe space where people don't have to be perfect because we're still in progress. This is just us reminding ourselves that we're not home yet, but we are on our way.

Health and Wellness Ministry's "Did You Know" for November American Diabetes Month Did you know...

*The symptoms for diabetes vary from urinating often, feeling very thirsty and hungry although you are eating, extreme fatigue and blurry vision

*There are several ways you can be tested for diabetes

A1C test which measures your average blood glucose for the past 2-3 months (there is no need to fast) Normal level is less than 5.79 Pre-diabetes level is 5.7 to 6.4 Diabetes level is 6.5 or higher

*Fasting Plasma Glucose (FPG) test checks fasting blood glucose levels which means the patient doesn't eat or drink anything other than water for at least 8 hours prior to taking the test this test is usually done in the morning for the best results Normal level is less than 100 mg/dl Pre-diabetes level is 100 mg/dl to 125 mg/d4l Diabetes level is 126 mg/dl or higher

*Oral Glucose Tolerance Test (OGTT) is a 2 hour test given to check blood sugar before and after the patient has been given a sweet drink this tells the doctor how the patient's body processes sugar Normal level is less than 140 mg/dl Pre-diabetes level is 140 mg/dl to 199 mg/dl Diabetes level is 200 mg/dl or higher

Now that you know if you have any of the symptoms listed above please make an appointment with your primary care doctor to be tested.

Black History Bytes by GBCOG, AAHM How Black Community feel about Thanksgiving

About 62 percent of the African-American community say that they don't think about the tragic history of

Thanksgiving while celebrating.

Thanksgiving has a tragic history, yet many Black people across the nation still choose to celebrate it in their own way. Some reframe it as a day to spend time with family, while others shop.

In an informal poll for this article, 45 percent of Black respondents, ages 13 to 60, shared that they love celebrating Thanksgiving.

"Our culture understands the falsehoods behind the holiday, but we enjoy connecting with family

and use it as an opportunity to do



so," one respondent said.

About 62 percent say they do not think about the history of Thanksgiving while celebrating.

"The true history of it is something I make sure my children are aware of, but we focus on the positive aspects of it as we gather with family," an individual said.

"Sort of like Halloween and Christmas, each holiday has issues," one person shared. "I choose to celebrate time with family and community instead of worrying about their origin."

"It makes me sad," another respondent said. "So, I try to think about the family part of Thanksgiving."

David Silverman, author of "<u>This Land Is Their Land: The Wampanoag Indians, Plymouth Colony, and the Troubled History of Thanksgiving,</u>" told the <u>Smithsonian</u> that "the myth is that friendly Indians, unidentified by tribe, welcome the Pilgrims to America, teach them how to live in this new place, sit down to dinner with them and then disappear."

According to the <u>African American Registry</u>, President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation establishing the Thanksgiving holiday in 1863. This was just months after he approved the Emancipation Proclamation. Thanksgiving used to be a time when slaves would frequently attempt to escape, because it was the end of the crop season. However, with the new rule, it changed into a time where newly liberated Blacks could gather. Then, Black Americans began celebrating Thanksgiving through the church.

Silverman, a professor at George Washington University, said the Thanksgiving myth attempts to overshadow the nation's attacks against Native Americans, who had been here 12,000 years before the Pilgrims, as well as oppression against people of African descent who were captured, brought here against their will and enslaved.

"Depicting the Pilgrims as the epitome of colonial America," Silverman said in his book, "also served to minimize the country's long-standing history of racial oppression at a time when Jim Crow was

working to return Blacks in the South to as close a state of slavery as possible, and racial segregation was becoming the norm nearly everywhere else."

While many Black Americans do not think about how Thanksgiving came to be, some individuals do not agree with the holiday's origins. One person shared that they do not connect with the historical aspect of the holiday.

"Thanksgiving, like Independence Day, is a holiday I must reframe every year to fit my worldview and value system as an African American. These days are not holy, but patriotic to ideals that are conflicting to me as a descendant of enslaved Africans. In short, they insult my humanity and are offensive as they reinforce the ideals of white supremacy year after year."


Another person said: "It's a made-up holiday to justify the exploitation of millions of indigenous peoples of this country. I'm not a fan."

Black Americans spend their time in different ways on Thanksgiving, but most use the time to be with their loved ones. Ninety-five percent of the Black Americans surveyed said they spend time with family during the holiday, 22.5 percent said they shop and 10 percent said they spend the day grieving.

While the day has since evolved in many ways for the Black community, many still use it as a day to give thanks and be grateful for family and loved ones.
