Make new friends and move mountains:



Dear Grace Baptist Church of Germantown,

Recognizing and supporting caregivers is among the most significant overlooked challenges facing the US, their families, and society. It should come as no surprise today that many caregivers are our children and relatives. In our "It's Time We Talk: First Friday" event, we will discuss who the care recipients and caregivers are, why the issue is important, tips on caregiving, male caregivers, care for persons with a life-limiting illness, palliative and hospice care, and self-care for caregivers (why and how).

Jerry Johnson, MD, Emeritus Professor of Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, will be our moderator for "Its Time We Talk: First Friday." He is nationally recognized for his expertise and leadership in aging, faculty development, and minority health care. Dr. Johnson has been a leader in aging and minority health issues for over 40 years. He is the former President of the American Geriatrics Society, former Chair of the Clinical Medicine Section of the Gerontological Society of America, and is currently Vice Chair of the Health in Aging Foundation, the public outreach arm of the American Geriatrics Society.

He served as Chief of Geriatric Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania from 2001 to 2018, leading the Division to prominence in clinical care, education, and research. Dr. Johnson is the author of over 200 publications related to aging and minority health issues and is an invited speaker on aging, minority health topics, and caregiving across the US and abroad. He is the past principal investigator of a Geriatric Workforce Enhancement Program (Health Resources and Services Administration) and has been a principal or coinvestigator of multiple research projects to establish health equity, some of which I have worked alongside him as a liaison with the connectional AME Church. Dr. Johnson has been a practicing physician for over 40 years and is recognized by patients and peers for his combination of clinical excellence and compassion while caring for patients from acute care to nursing facility care.

Due to the significant challenges we face in caregiving support, a special request has been made to open this event to the public. 
Martin Luther King Sunday, January 14, 2024 at 10:00 am Service
